For over 50 years the Wayne United Way has provided a cost effective way to raise funds for a number of agencies serving the Wayne area. Since funded agencies incur no fund raising expenses, the maximum amount of funds are available to provide agency services.

Wayne United Way agencies this year are:

Wayne Girl Scouts — \$1,000

Girl Scouting provides an education to young girls to learn new skills and develop self esteem which helps them become competent resourceful women. Special activities include programs that deal with issues such as literacy, the environment, substance abuse and health and fitness. Camping offers girls arts and crafts, canoeing, horseback riding, and cooking.

Haven House is a domestic abuse and sexual assault crisis intervention agency. Located in Wayne, services provided to a five county area are: a 24 hour crisis line, emergency transportation, safe shelter for survivors and children, crisis Intervention support, medical advocacy, peer support groups, court and protection order advocacy. Public awareness education, in-services, and training is also offered.

Northeast Nebraska Child Advocacy Center — \$2,000

A Child Advocacy Center is a child-friendly, coordinated program in one location where representatives from many disciplines gather evidence, evaluate, and make decisions about the investigation, treatment, prosecution and prevention of child victimization. This multidisciplinary team includes law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, and medical and mental health professionals.

The Wayne Public Library mission of service has a special emphasis placed on materials and programs of interest and benefit to children and youth that support enrichment of reading and learning. United Way funds are used to support the promotion of early reading by providing a "Books for Babies" bag to every newborn at Wayne Providence Medical Center, and the "1000 Books Before Kindergarten" program. These programs assist the library with building relationships with area families and encouraging a love of reading from the time they are born. Through the generosity of Wayne United Way, the "Books for Babies" bag contains a board book, early literacy resources, rattle & information about the library; and youth participating in the "1000 Books Before Kindergarten" receive a book at 500 books and a bag at 1000. Funds are also used for our "100 Books" programs that benefit older readers.
